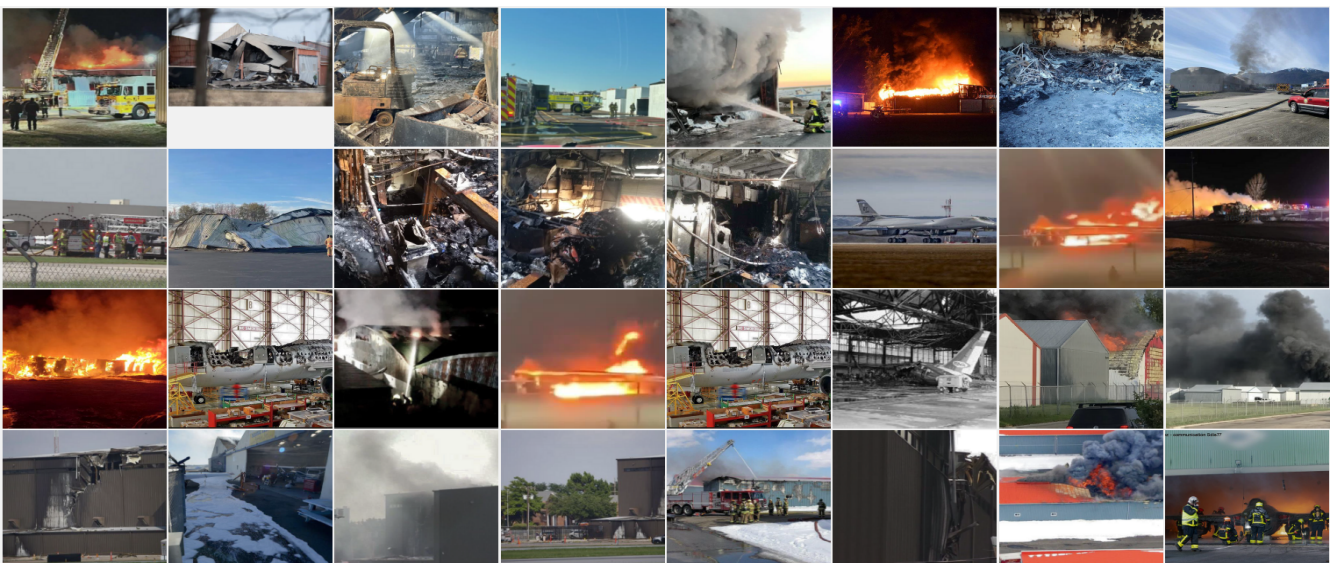

The Claremore Fire Department responded to a hangar fire at the Claremore Regional Airport Monday morning.

Firefighters said the fire started at the airport near Highway 20 and South 4230 Road just after 4 a.m.

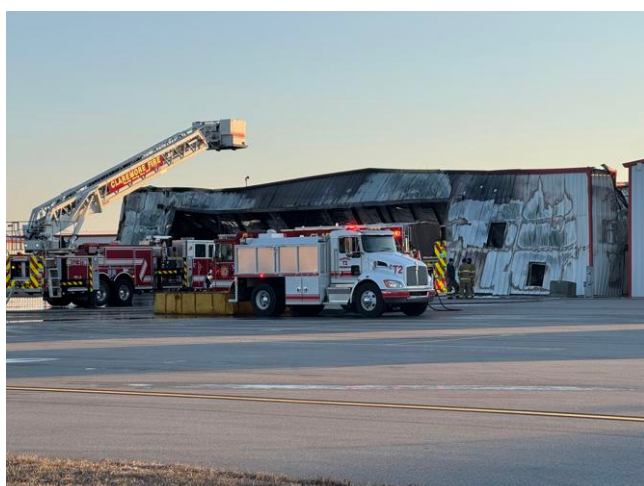
Two airplanes and a helicopter were inside of the hangar at the time of the fire. The airplanes were pushed out by the people who called the fire department, but the helicopter remains inside.

"Metal building with this much heat exposure, it's not really a good prognosis for the building," said Claremore Fire Chief Sean Douglas.

The people were burned as they pushed the planes out of the hangar. One person was transported to the hospital and one was treated on scene, firefighters said.

"Being an airport hangar, it's going to be a fairly high-dollar loss," Douglas said.

The Oklahoma State Fire Marshal will assist with the investigation of the fire.

A weekend fire that destroyed a hangar at the East Texas Regional Airport remains under investigation.

The airport's fire department, Longview Fire Department and Elderville-Lakeport Volunteer Fire Department responded to the blaze at about 8 p.m. Saturday, according to the Elderville-Lakeport Volunteer Fire Department.

The hangar was a private one, and the fire did not affect airport operations, said Max Tovar, the airport director.

"It was just unfortunate that most of the hangar inside was a complete loss," he said.

The fire destroyed the aircraft and other contents of the hangar.

The blaze was contained around 11 p.m., according to the Elderville-Lakeport department.

The hangar is on the southeast side of the airport.

Gregg County Fire Marshal Mark Moore is investigating the blaze, CBS19 reported.

Moore did not immediately return calls seeking comment.

A fire that damaged two hangars at Minden Tahoe Airport on Oct. 1 was caused by a portable lithium ion powered “jump pack” that overheated, the East Fork Fire Protection District said on Thursday.

East Fork firefighters responded to a report of smoke coming from a hangar at around 4:40 p.m.

Firefighters arrived to find smoke coming from Hangars D and F, along with water from the fire sprinkler system.

Once out, the source of the fire was traced to a workbench next to the wall in one hangar. The jump pack generated so much heat that it caused combustible material in a neighboring hangar to ignite.

“This lithium battery ignition caused the fire to get really hot, really fast,” said Fire Chief Tod Carlini. “The fire would have been much larger with more property and building loss had the fire sprinkler system not been installed and in working condition.”

A single sprinkler head in each hangar was able to suppress the fire prior to the arrival of firefighters, according to the district, reducing property loss, including three planes and an antique vehicle. The sprinklers also reduced the hazard to firefighters if the fire came into contact with the jet fuel in the aircraft.

“This fire with the significantly reduced property loss and risk to the firefighters is a perfect example as to why the fire code requires fire sprinkler systems in aircraft hangars.” stated Deputy Chief and Fire Marshal Amy Ray.

Firefighters said any lithium ion battery powered items should be charged following the manufacturer’s specifications that come with the purchased item.

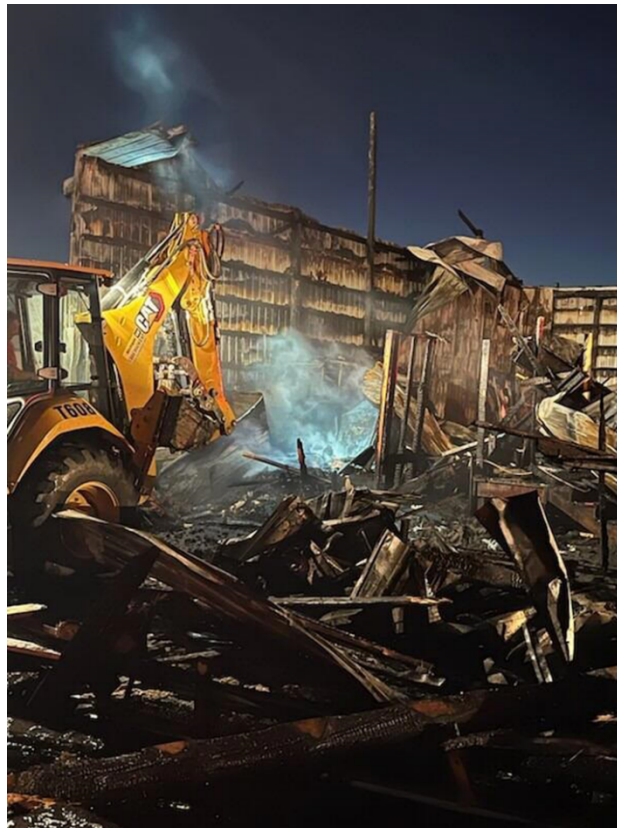

An airport spokesperson says airport operations are not being affected by the fire and the fire is under control.

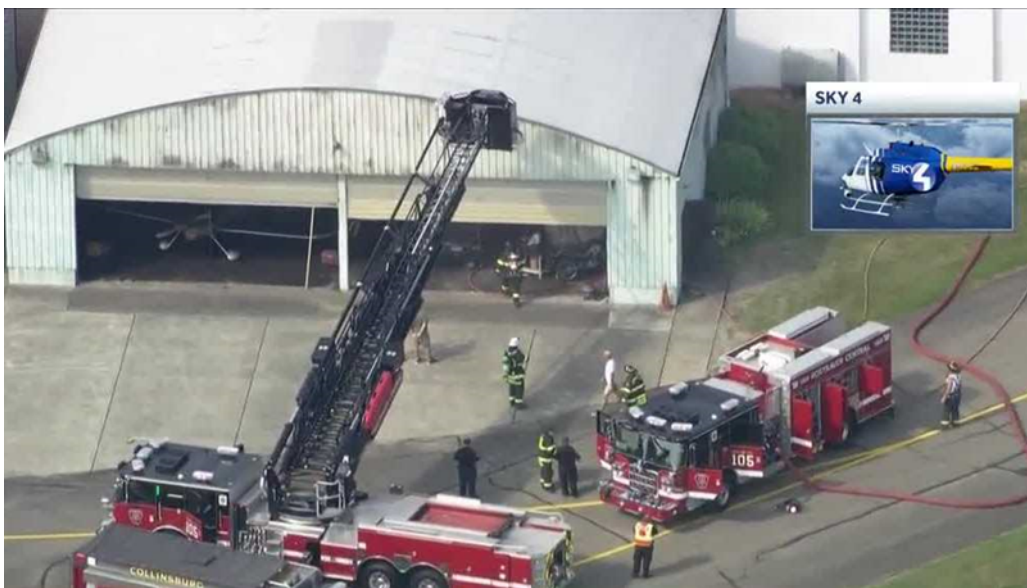

The old Goose Bay Airport in the municipality of Happy Valley-Goose Bay, Newfoundland and Labrador, Canada, has been destroyed by fire.

A former airport hangar caught fire on Friday, leading to evacuations and concerns about potential explosions due to the fire nearby explosive materials. The situation is now under control, and no injuries have been reported.

The incident details

On Friday, a blaze erupted in a former airport hangar in Happy Valley-Goose Bay, triggering multiple explosions and necessitating an evacuation, prompting officials to declare a state of emergency, according to a statement released by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP).

Firefighters fought the fire all night, causing significant damage to several commercial buildings. Residents of the town were advised to remain at least a kilometer away from the area, which can be described as from the end of the airport to the docks.

On Saturday, the town of Happy Valley-Goose Bay ended the state of emergency, allowing residents to return to their properties. Hamilton River Road, connecting Happy Valley-Goose Bay and Sheshatshiu, is now open for travel.

However, non-residents are advised to avoid specific streets — Halifax Street, Toronto Street, Winnipeg Street, Ottawa Street, and London Street — as firefighters and investigators continue their work in those areas. The cause of the fire remains unknown at this time, and the investigation is ongoing, according to the RCMP.

Residents Monica and Keith Legge of Happy Valley-Goose Bay told Canadian media outlet CBC that "the building was a landmark and that his father worked there many years ago," adding that:

"There's a lot of people that passed through that airport coming in that came to Goose Bay. A lot of history, all gone."

About Goose Bay Airport

Indeed, the former airport holds historical significance as a Canadian Forces Base managed by the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF), with its central RCAF unit referred to as 5 Wing Goose Bay, commonly known as 5 Wing.

It was constructed in 1941 during World War II, together with the creation of the 5 Wing Goose Bay unit. The site was selected because of the excellent flying weather, ease of construction, accessibility by sea during the summer months, and its strategic location, which helps to protect North American airspace.

Goose Bay also functioned as a forward operating location for RCAF McDonnell Douglas CF-18 Hornet fighters. Additionally, the base and surrounding area were occasionally utilized to support units of the Canadian Army during training exercises. The airfield also served civilian purposes, with civilian operations referring to the facility as Goose Bay Airport. This airport is designated as an airport of entry by Nav Canada and is operated by the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA).

GRIFFITH, Ind. (WLS) -- A fire at a northwest Indiana airport left a hangar damaged Thursday night, the Lake County Sheriff's Office said.

A police officer with the sheriff's office was on patrol shortly after 11:30 p.m. when he saw a small fire at the Griffith-Merrillville Airport .

The fire caused the roof of one of the airport's hangars to collapse.

No injuries were reported and the Indiana State Fire Marshal's office is working to determine the cause of the fire and if any aircraft were damaged, the sheriff's office said.

The Lake County Sheriff's Department Aviation Unit has a hangar and aircraft at the facility at the airport which were not damaged, the sheriff's office said.

Four aircraft were lost when a hangar at South Carolina's Greenville Downtown Airport (KGMU) was destroyed in an early-morning fire last month. No one was injured in the blaze.

The hangar was owned by the Greenville-based charter, maintenance, and aircraft management company [Special Services Corporation](#) (SSC). In addition to the aircraft, two of which belonged to SSC's charter fleet and two of which were client-owned aircraft in for maintenance, the company lost much of its tooling and support equipment. SSC reported that the firewall protecting its office held, saving contents including the aircraft logbooks. The company said the hangar itself, the roof of which collapsed in the fire, is a total loss.

"This incident, while a setback, has demonstrated the resilience and unity of our team and community," said SSC president of sales and marketing Doug Goldstrom, "We are currently working with authorities to investigate the cause of the fire and are already resuming maintenance and all flight operations and hope to rebuild the facility swiftly."

The fire was called in to the Greenville Fire Department at 3:52 a.m. on November 13. Firefighters were on the scene at 4:18 a.m. but reportedly found the roof already partially collapsed and the building engulfed in flame. The fire did not affect operations at the airport. The investigation into the incident is ongoing.

"We're grateful to the community and to our amazing and resilient clients for their support and patience as we work toward rebuilding our operations," Goldstrom said. "We are committed to keeping our clients and the community informed over the coming days as we make plans and move forward."

At approximately 4:30 p.m. on Friday, August 25, 2023 a fire in an aircraft hangar was reported by a bystander at the Lake Havasu City Airport. The first arriving fire company stationed at the Airport reported smoke coming from a large door on a hangar. After gaining entry, a working fire was visible in the back of the hangar which did have an aircraft inside. The hangar is in an area that has multiple hangars within close proximity. The fire did extend from the original hangar to an adjacent hangar.

Four Engine Companies, one Truck Company, one Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting vehicle and a Battalion Chief responded to the fire and gained control of the fire in 29 minutes. There were no occupants in the hangars at the time of the fire. There were no reported injuries to the firefighters. CERT responded to the fire with six personnel to assist with rehab duties for the firefighters. Crews remained on the scene an additional 3 hours conducting fire investigation and salvage operations. The cause of the fire is under investigation.

A hangar at Leesburg Executive Airport caught fire at around 2 a.m. Sunday, damaging nine planes, the Town of Leesburg reported. No injuries were reported.

Damages were estimated at more than \$7 million, including the structure, aircraft, vehicles and other contents, according to the Loudoun County Fire Marshal's Office, which continues to investigate the cause of the fire.

The fire occurred in the B T-hangar on the north end of the airfield. A Leesburg Police officer on patrol noticed smoke and reported it to dispatchers. Loudoun Fire-Rescue units from Leesburg, Ashburn, Lansdowne, and Moorefield responded and found heavy smoke and visible fire on all sides of the building. Incident command requested a Rapid Intervention Task Force, bringing additional fire and rescue units from Leesburg, Hamilton, and Kincora.

Crews extinguished the fire shortly afterward. The airport remains open for business.

No one was in the building at the time Capital City Fire/Rescue responded to a call reporting smoke exuding from a privately owned airport hangar at the Juneau International Airport at around 8 a.m. Thursday, according to CCFR Fire Marshal Dan Jager.

Jager told the Empire at the scene later that morning that CCFR officials reached the scene shortly after the call, closed down the roadway and began extinguishing what he described as a “small fire.” “Our biggest problem was the smoke, the fire didn’t last long,” he said. “It was more just chasing smoke.”

The fire did not affect airport operations.

Jager said through investigation CCFR determined the cause of the fire was electrical and remained confined in the wall space of the building after it ignited from a screw that penetrated a wire through drywall and was touching a metal plate.

He said the ignition was likely a “very slow” process and estimates around only 2% of the building suffered damages, which were estimated at approximately \$30,000.

Airport Manager Patty Wahto told the Empire that the building, used for aircraft storage, is privately owned by L&A Bennett Second Family Limited Partnership, but the land is owned and leased out by the airport. The hangar is commonly referred to as the “LAB hangar.”

The fire destroyed one space intended for helicopters

Charcoal, twisted metals, melted plastics, hanging cables, debris and the water that the firefighters threw to try to put out the flames: that is the scenario presented by the **hangar of the Navy's frigate 'Santa María'** (F-81), after The fire which he suffered on the night of Friday, October 7 at the **naval base of Rota**.

Photographs taken after the fire was extinguished show the damage caused by the fire. The flames destroyed the interior of the hangar in which the **SH-60B Seahawk helicopters** of the Aircraft Flotilla are transported.

Damage assessment was in a hurry, since the Navy commanders had to "determine the lines of action in order to **take over in 'Operation Atalanta'**, which the frigate was scheduled to join from next **Sunday, October 9**".

According to the local newspaper 'Rota al día', which advanced the news of the fire, **This incident is going to cause** A delay in the relief of Navy ships in 'Operation Atalanta' to fight piracy off the coast of Somalia, in the Indian Ocean. The 'Santa María' was going to leave this Sunday, October 9 to relieve the **'Numancia'**.

The sources consulted by *ECD* point out that the news that was published on Friday night, together with the images and some alarmist comments - which pointed to the existence of injured sailors - unleashed **concern among relatives of soldiers who were at that time on the frigate** affected by the fire, and those who were on duty.

Some of these relatives **called hospitals** asking about these alleged wounded, and others **approached the access controls** to the Rota naval base. The Navy confirmed to Europa Press that there had been no personal damage, but only material damage.

A B-1B Lancer bomber at Dyess Air Force Base, Texas, may be unsalvageable after it caught fire on the flightline Wednesday night.

The jet was undergoing routine engine maintenance around 10 p.m. local time when flames erupted, according to a Thursday news release from the 7th Bomb Wing at the base.

[A video posted](#) to the airman nco snco Facebook page the same day shows an aircraft engulfed in flames and captioned “Dyess AFB B-1 engine blew up.” The wing is looking into the recording’s authenticity.

Two people sustained injuries that were not life-threatening, and were treated at a nearby hospital and released, the wing said. Staff Sgt. Holly Cook, a wing spokesperson, declined to answer whether they were maintainers working on the bomber.

“Emergency response personnel arrived immediately and contained the scene,” according to the release. “Cleanup operations have begun.”

The incident is under investigation.

“We are so grateful that all members of Team Dyess involved have been treated and are now safely back at home,” said 7th Bomb Wing commander Col. Joseph Kramer. “Thank you to our first responders who arrived immediately on scene and executed a real-world emergency response with the same level of professionalism and proficiency as they do in training.”

“Our B-1 fleet and warfighters remain ready to execute any long-range strike mission,” he added.

Three people were injured after an Embraer aircraft caught fire in the Coopesa (Cooperativa Autogestionaria de Servicios Aeroindustriales RL) hangar, located at Juan Santamaría International Airport in Alajuela.

Apparently, three Coopesa workers were conducting repair work when the fire broke out inside the aircraft.

Officials are vowing to rebuild the air hangar at the Tyendinaga Mohawk Airport after a massive fire destroyed the building and 13 planes.

The fire broke out at the airport in Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory, located between Napanee and Belleville, at approximately 11 p.m. Thursday. Within minutes the fire spread through the entire building.

"Devastated for our loss. I am grateful that nobody was injured," said Joanne Tabobandung, Dean of Aviation for the First Nations Technical Institute.

Students spotted the blaze from their residence next door and called 911.

"It'll stay in everybody's memory books for sure," said Scott Maracle, Mohawk Fire Chief.

"It was burning so bad when we got here that we just knew there was not much hope of saving anything."

The Tyendinaga Mohawk Airfield was built as a training facility for First World War pilots. The hangar is home to a flight training school for the First Nations Technical Institute, a post-secondary school for Indigenous students located in Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory.

"I've been here since 1990. I was a student in one of the first class," Tabobandung said.

"I had my wedding in this hangar. I met my husband in this hangar. And that's why it's really hard." Thirteen planes inside the hangar were destroyed in the fire. The single-engine and twin-engine planes were for students.

The school is now collecting donations in the hopes of returning.

"We'll rebuild. We'll come back," Tabobandung said.

Update on the Hangar Fire at FNTI's Aviation Campus

Last night (Feb 24th), at around 11PM, the hangar at FNTI's Aviation Campus became involved in a massive structural fire. Fire services from Tyendinaga, Deseronto and Napanee responded to the call.

Fire can be a sudden and dangerous consequence of plane crashes if certain factors align. However, such accidents are not the only instances whereby an aircraft can find itself aflame. Indeed, in 2007, fire destroyed a Qatar Airways Airbus A300 while it was undergoing maintenance in a hangar in Abu Dhabi. But how exactly did this happen?

The Aircraft Involved

A7-ABV was a Qatar Airways Airbus A300-600R that, according to data from ATDB.aero, entered service with China Northern Airlines as B-2312 in July 1993. It was completed at Airbus's Toulouse factory in March 1993, and bore the test registration F-WWAP. It spent five years with the carrier, before leaving for lessors AWAS (Ansett Worldwide Aviation Services).

The aircraft joined AWAS as VH-CLL a year after leaving China Northern, in July 1999. However, it didn't spend long there, and moved on to Qatar Airways just after the turn of the century, in March 2000. It was at this point that it took on the registration A7-ABV, becoming the fourth A300-600R to join Qatar Airways from Ansett Worldwide Aviation Services

A pilot has single-handedly saved about £1million worth of small planes from a fire.

Andy Wilkins was staying in a caravan onsite at Bodmin Airfield in Cornwall when he heard a loud bang.

As flames and smoke spread across one of the hangars, the flying instructor pushed several planes to safety outside.

He was stopped by Cornwall Fire Service when they arrived on the scene "because the smoke was pretty intense".

"I came out and saw flames coming out, called 999 and thought the next priority was to get the aircraft out of the hangar," Mr. Wilkins explained.

"They're important to us and the flying club at Cornwall and I just got them out, I'm a bit stiff this morning."

The fire was first reported at 19:30 BST on Friday 22 October.

Mr. Wilkins managed to push eight planes out of the next-door hangar to where the blaze started, creating a fire break.

Darren Fern, chairman Bodmin Flying Club, said: "If all of the aircraft had been lost, there's potentially up to a million pounds worth of aircraft sitting here and Andy saved those.

"The fire brigade did a brilliant job of containing it but by emptying the hangar that was next door to it, it gave us a firebreak that saved all of the others so to do that all, virtually on his own, was an amazing job."

Cornwall Fire & Rescue Service had five fire engines on the scene to deal with the incident.

The cause of the fire is being determined.

Firefighters faced a highly dangerous mission to extinguish the flames.

A man has suffered burns to his hands after a fire engulfed a hangar at Jandakot airport in Perth's west on Wednesday afternoon.

One aircraft was incinerated with only the tip of what was a propeller visible in the aftermath. Fire emergency services raced to the scene to battle the blaze.

Two planes were saved but tools and equipment were lost and adjacent hangars also suffered some damage.

Airport staff watched on as the fire broke out just after 1pm.

It's understood the inferno started when a new air compressor caught fire.

The situation was made even more dangerous when drums of jet fuel exploded, creating an extremely difficult mission for fire crews.

Foam was used to help bring the flames down.

The hangar is privately owned and one of the planes to go up in flames was a rare and valuable replica of an original Royal Flying Doctor Service plane.

Despite thick plumes of black smoke billowing into the air, Jandakot Airport didn't close. Aircraft were still taking off and landing as firefighters raced to save grounded planes.

Surrounding streets were, however, taped off.

Fire investigators are estimating the damage bill could be in the vicinity of \$1 million.

Engineers luckily escaped when a Ryanair plane loaded with fuel accidentally caught fire whilst testing was being carried out for a leaky tank. The fire occurred on Wednesday, March 8 inside the hangar which is run by Prestwick aircraft maintenance.

A Ryanair spokeswoman explained that the wing had not actually caught fire and said that, “There was a minor incident and all safety and reporting procedures were followed.

“There was no risk to staff at any time nor any damage to the aircraft.”

**** Update: 07/23/20 @ 10:30 UTC** - a spokesperson from Liege Airport shared some photographs from the fire - included below. ******A massive fire broke out at Liege Airport, Belgium, last night in the hangar of the Aeroservices company. The blaze broke out near to the airport terminal at 22:00 local time (20:00 UTC) and took approximately two hours to contain. Flight operations to and from the airport were halted for a short time. There have been no reports of damage to aircraft or injuries to personnel from the fire.

What happened?

Local media reported that the fire broke out late last night in the B30 facility, situated between the passenger terminal and the airport's petrol facilities. This facility houses the Aeroservices and Western Global companies, consisting mainly of offices and equipment.

Fire services from both the airport and the city of Liege attended the scene and managed to get the fire under control within several hours. The airport confirmed that no people had been hurt in the fire. The blaze, which could be seen from the motorway, did not generate any harmful fumes, and the hotel near the airport did not have to be evacuated.

However, the smoke did cause some problems for landing aircraft. Three planes were diverted, including an ASL Airlines Belgium flight from Berlin and a Bluebird Nordic Boeing 737-400 that departed from Vienna. Both flights were able to land safely at Brussels Airport. Flights resumed soon after the fire services had the situation under control.

Local media have reported that the damage caused by the blaze is significant. The cause of the fire is yet to be determined.

Visit from the king

Liege Airport is located five nautical miles west of the city of Liege, Belgium. This little-known airport is the 7th biggest cargo hub in Europe! The airport recently made a name for itself when it was chosen by the World Health Organisation to act as a hub for the distribution of medical supplies for Europe amid the coronavirus pandemic. So far, over a billion masks have been distributed via the airport!

Its crucial role in ensuring that Europe received much needed medical equipment recently earned it a visit from King Philippe of Belgium. The sovereign, who himself trained as a helicopter pilot at Liege Airport, visited the airport on July 9th to thank staff and keyworkers for their role in battling the pandemic.

After visiting the Cargo Nord area and the FedEx distribution premises, the king ended the visit by holding a roundtable with managers from several companies and institutions. These groups have been involved in fighting the pandemic on the logistics front and included ASL Airlines Belgium, Swissport, FedEx, Alibaba group, and customs authorities.

Passenger flights only just opened

While Belgium's largest cargo hub has remained very active in receiving and distributing supplies during the coronavirus pandemic, passenger services only resumed last week. TUI fly Belgium is the only passenger airline operating from Liege Airport, and its passenger flights resumed on July 17th.

The carrier offers flights to 11 destinations in four countries; Spain, Turkey, Greece, and Morocco. The resumption of flights from Liege is good news for the airline, which has been forced to cancel many of its routes this summer due to COVID-19.

The mayor said the airport operations are still functioning, but at a slower pace. The mayor said the airport generates about \$6 million in economic activity for the city each year. It is also home to the Monmouth Flying Club, which was training six future pilots.

A hangar at the "María Reiche" aerodrome in Vista Alegre caught fire this afternoon, possibly due to a short circuit, causing significant material damage to a small aircraft that had arrived at the terminal for maintenance after operating in the jungle.

Initial reports indicate that the fire broke out in the Air Majoro company hangar around 4 p.m. The flames quickly reached a Cessna twin-engine 1920 aircraft, which regularly operates in the Peruvian jungle. Although an emergency team from Corpac managed to control the fire, the flames caused significant material damage to the hangar's structure and partially affected the aircraft.

Authorities have not released the identities of the victims, pending notification of next of kin.

"I visited the scene and was briefed by incident command," Dallas County Judge Clay Jenkins tweeted.

"Please pray for the families who lost loved ones in this tragedy. Team in process of notifying them."

Video footage shows columns of thick black smoke billowing from the hangar. No-one was inside when the aircraft plunged through its roof.

Two tyres of the aircraft also caught fire and burst, sending huge smoke into the air. No one was injured in the incident.

"I went to the tarmac to see what happened. They were trying to motor the engine in the hangar, which is not done, especially for turbo props. We don't do that because the rotor will be moving. So when they did that it hit ground power.

"The ground power sparked and caught fire and the two tyres of the aircraft caught fire and burst and the aircraft went into flames. The three persons in the aircraft walked out of the aircraft.

"Motoring is a situation where you switch on the ignition without fully starting the engine. In a car, it is when you switch on the car halfway without starting the engine. You can listen and play music, wound down the glass and honk," the eyewitness who is also a pilot explained.

Mrs. Yakubu said there was no official reason for the fire but added that the Accident Investigation Bureau (AIB) would soon swing into action.

A spokesperson for the Prince Albert Police said both fire and ambulance were on the scene when they arrived. She said police continue to hold the scene today, but the fire department is leading the investigation.

Flights resume following major fire that caused 10 flights to Dublin to be diverted to Shannon and Belfast

Dublin airport has reopened to flights after a major fire in a hangar forced planes to be diverted to Shannon and Belfast on Wednesday morning.

No one was reported injured in the blaze, which was in an area of the airport estate in north Dublin usually cordoned off from passengers.

Smoke billowing from the fire in hangar three, which started around 7am, forced the temporary closure of the runway, Dublin Airport Authority said. Pictures tweeted from the scene showed large flames engulfing one side of the metal hangar.

Six flights scheduled to land in Dublin on Wednesday morning were diverted to Shannon airport in Ireland's south-west. A further four planes were told by air traffic control to fly further north into the George Best/Belfast City airport.

A DAA spokesman said flights were disrupted for around 90 minutes before services into and from Dublin airport were able to return to normal. So far a cause for the blaze had yet to be determined, the DAA spokesman added.

The owner of hangar three, Eirtech Aviation, also confirmed that no one had been injured in the fire on its premises.

In a statement, Eirtech Aviation said: "The fire is limited to a section of roofing and the Dublin Airport Fire Brigade is on site managing the situation.

"We understand from the emergency services that the fire has been contained (as at 8.35am).

"We can confirm that there have been no injuries and all personnel on site have been evacuated and are safe."

The company statement added: "The aircraft in the hangar are not affected but will be fully inspected in due course, as safety is Eirtech Aviation's number one priority.

"We are working closely with the authorities at Dublin airport and apologise to all passengers for the disruption caused as a result of the fire."

Two “Whisper” jets – one of which is operated by CityJet that runs an air route from Dublin to the City of London airport and Paris – were in hangar three at the time. However it is understood that no major damage was caused to either aircraft.

Dublin airport is the hub for some of the busiest routes in Europe and is now also a major centre for transatlantic air traffic. In the first six months of this year the DAA reported that 11.5 million passengers had passed through its doors – a 15% increase in numbers compared with the same period last year.

Airlines such as Aer Lingus and Ryanair fly to 25 different destinations in the UK alone from Dublin airport. Just over a million passengers between January and June 2015 flew across the Atlantic from Dublin, with the airport now operating 22 new routes to different destinations in North America, Britain, Europe and the Middle East.

A Greek air force F-16 fighter jet crashed into a hangar at a military base in Albacete, southeastern Spain.

NATO nations whose objective is to expand the effectiveness of allied forces through the development of leadership skills.

SAN DIEGO – An explosive three-alarm fire engulfed three hangars at Brown Field Tuesday, heavily damaging two light planes inside the structures, causing an estimated \$700,000 worth of damage and forcing a several-hour closure of the municipal airport’s runways.

Witnesses heard several explosions before a hangar at Brown Field at the 1400 block of Continental Street caught fire Tuesday afternoon. The witnesses told Fox 5, at least three aircraft storing units ignited within minutes of the explosions.

Administrators of the general-aviation airport near the U.S.-Mexico line suspended flight operations while about 130 firefighters worked to subdue the flames.

As the fire raged out of control, firefighters were forced to hold back and take a defensive stance. It took them roughly 90 minutes to extinguish the blaze, San Diego Fire-Rescue Department spokesman Lee Swanson said.

Investigators did not release a cause of the fire Monday evening. According to one airport tenant, it’s not unusual for people to store fuel and other flammable materials in their hangars.

Fire destroys at least three hangars at Brown Field

“Probably a fuel ignited somehow. Sometimes if you leave a battery on charge overnight – which you just don’t do – and there’s fuel around it, then it atomizes jet fuel and that’s it,” said Jeffrey Schuster, who stores three aircraft at Brown Field.

Schuster’s property was not damaged.

The fire gutted two hangars and heavily damaged a third. Investigators set the property losses at \$100,000 to the structures and \$600,000 to contents.

Normal operations resumed at Brown Field about 3:30 p.m., said airport operations assistant Andy Schwartz.

The official helicopter of the Andhra Pradesh chief minister and six Cessna trainer aircraft belonging to the state aviation academy were gutted when a major fire broke out in the hangar at the old airport at Begumpet in Hyderabad late on Monday night.

While the official helicopter -Agusta Westland AW139 caught fire in the hangar No. 3 and was gutted along with six aircraft in an adjacent hangar. According to preliminary inquiries by the Hyderabad police, the mishap might have occurred due to short circuit.

The Begumpet airport located in the heart of the city was closed for civil aircraft in 2008, after the opening of Rajiv Gandhi International Airport at Shamshabad, about 45 km from city. At present, Begumpet airport is mostly used for landing of VIP planes and also for trainer aircraft of the aviation academy.

Chief minister N Kiran Kumar Reddy, who is presently touring Visakhapatnam district, ordered a comprehensive inquiry by the Crime Investigation Department (CID) into the destruction of the official chopper. The CID officials, assisted by the Clues team of the Hyderabad police, began the investigation by gathering evidences from the accident spot. The entire area was cordoned off by the armed police and media persons were prevented from entering the premises.

A team of officials from the director-general of civil aviation (DGCA) are also landing in Hyderabad in the evening to probe the actual cause of the mishap.

According to state minister for ports and airports Ganta Srinivasa Rao, the mysterious fire broke out around midnight on Monday. The devastating fire spread to the entire area within no time, as the aviation turbine fuel in the chopper as well as the aircraft caught fire resulting in huge flames.

The overnight fire in the hangar F of Ruzyně Airport caused damage of about 200 million crowns, according to firefighters' estimates. An ATR 42 aircraft belonging to ČSA burned down. The police have not yet confirmed the extent of the damage. The cause of the fire is being investigated.

A small aircraft caught fire in the CHC Táxi Aéreo hangar at Marechal Rondon Airport in Várzea Grande. The engine and the entire right side of the Embraer Seneca 810 twin-engine plane were destroyed. The flames even reached the ceiling of the hangar, which was subsequently sealed off by firefighters. No one was injured.

According to an employee, the fire started from the inside out of the right engine while mechanics were draining the aircraft's fuel for maintenance.

At the time of the fire, there were 7 mechanics in the hangar who were unable to control the flames, even after using all 10 extinguishers available. There was a lot of smoke, and part of the ceiling turned black. A large amount of water was on the floor, and the aircraft was visibly destroyed. The employees believe that there will be no way to recover the right engine and the affected wing. "Nothing we tried was enough; it's good that they (the firefighters) arrived quickly."

According to 1st Sergeant and head of the Fire Department team, José de Barros Filho, the fire started at 1:30 PM and was brought under control in 15 minutes. "There was a lot of smoke in the area. The flames reached the top of the hangar." The ceiling, which is more than 6 meters high, was scorched.

The sergeant could not determine the cause of the fire but mentioned that a similar aircraft model, which was partially burned, had its side paint affected. The hangar also contained another small aircraft in the back, but its structure was not compromised. The sergeant said the hangar is closed until the owner hires an engineer to inspect and clear the unit.

To control the flames, 3 vehicles were deployed, using a foam-generating liquid (LGE) since the fire was caused by airplane fuel.

The Brazilian Airport Infrastructure Company (Infraero) issued a statement emphasizing that there were no victims and that, together with the Fire Department's Airport Fire Section units, a medical team was sent. "The time between deployment and extinguishing the fire was 1 minute and 15 seconds."

Considerable property damage was caused on Thursday morning in the fire of a hangar at Hamm airfield. Several aircraft were affected, and the hangar built in the 1960s is probably ready for demolition. No one was injured.

"There is practically nothing left of some aircraft and also the balloons stored here," said the 2nd chairman of the Hamm Air Sports Club, Michael Zwilling. He assumed "certainly significant six-figure damage". Why Hall IV on the site in the Lippewiesen went up in flames remains unclear so far.

At around 9.30 a.m., the fire brigade moved out with a large contingent. 58 firefighters from the professional fire brigade and six volunteer fire brigades fought the fire and had it under control after about an hour. The extinguishing work lasted until noon.

The situation was particularly precarious because a gas tank filled with about 5,000 liters was near the fire. Heessener Straße had to be temporarily closed to make room for the fire engines. Under respiratory protection, the firefighters managed to push some of the original six machines outside. Some club members also helped. "We have at least two, but probably three total losses," Zwilling stated, while the fire experts of the police took a close look at the hall in the afternoon.

The second chairman did not want to participate in speculation about the origin of the fire. "There is absolutely no obvious cause," he said. In addition to a Cessna 182, an ultralight aircraft was destroyed. Both are privately owned. In addition, four hot air balloons, the transport trailers and a Bulli were robbed by the flames. The gas cylinders for the balloons were brought outside by the fire brigade and cooled.

In the afternoon, a dozen club members tried to limit the damage further. The machines were stored in the glider hangar, and the clubhouse also had to be winterized. The fire had apparently damaged supply lines. "We have to make sure that the clubhouse doesn't freeze," said Zwilling. Memories were awakened of the two crashes with fatal outcomes in recent years. "We've seen worse. It's a good thing that nothing happened to anyone today. -Fl

Two helicopters—one civilian and the other institutional—along with other facilities, were affected by a fire that broke out in the Carabineros hangar at the Teniente Vidal airfield in Coyhaique.

According to General Jorge Rojas, head of the XI Carabineros zone, the incident occurred around 3:30 p.m. on Sunday, impacting both aircraft and the adjacent facilities of the Special Operations Group (GOPE), which were also damaged by the fire.

Investigators probe for cause

Danbury (AP) — A fire at Danbury Airport Wednesday night destroyed a hangar that housed a charter flight company and a restaurant, causing millions of dollars in damages, officials said.

Firefighters from Danbury and nearby departments battled the blaze at the Reliant Air Building. The fire broke out about 10 p.m.

It destroyed the hangar and nine aircraft inside the building, including two private jets and seven other planes, state police said.

Another 15 planes outside the hangar were damaged.

"The property damage is significant and the planes that were in the hangar — already we're talking probably between \$20 and \$25 million worth of damage," Chief Geoff Herald told WTNH-TV.

Reliant has been in business since 1989 and employs five full-time and six part-time pilots.

The building housed the charter flight company and other businesses, including McNally's Steak & Ale House.

"It was probably the worst fire I've seen since being mayor," Danbury Mayor Mark Boughton told The News-Times newspaper. "The first responders have done an outstanding job. It was a very difficult blaze to manage, but they did a terrific job."

The fire marshal was on the scene Thursday morning but had not yet determined a cause.

Everyone inside the building managed to get out safely.

A fire overnight at the Sabena Technics hangar in Brussels national airport has destroyed four aircraft including a Belgian armed forces Lockheed Martin C-130H Hercules and an Airbus A320 belonging to Armenian national carrier Armavia.

The fire started just after 00:00 and was brought under control by around 02:30, says Brussels International Airport (BIAC), the airport operator.

The Sabena Technics hangar, around 1,000m² (10,760ft²), reached temperatures of at least 100°C (212°F) buckling the all-metal structure, bringing the roof down, firefighters say. The fire continued to burn into the morning, authorities add. Firefighters say the priority was to avoid the fire spreading to the neighbouring hangar, owned by the Belgian branch of World of TUI, Jetairfly.

One Sabena Technics employee was seriously injured and taken to hospital. A further four were treated for minor injuries.

BIAC says one C-130, operated by the Belgian military, was totally destroyed in the fire and Sabena Technics says the hangar also housed three other aircraft at the time of the blaze. Sabena Technics says one of the aircraft was an Airbus A320 operated by Armavia, which lost another of its aircraft this week in a fatal accident over the Black Sea.

Sabena confirms that other aircraft in the hangar were damaged, but are unable to give further details of the operator, type or extent of the damage.

The maintenance facility is rated to undertake C- and D-checks on Boeing 737 and 767s in addition to A320s and C-130s. Air transport from Brussels was minorly disrupted, with delays of 15-20min in early flights.

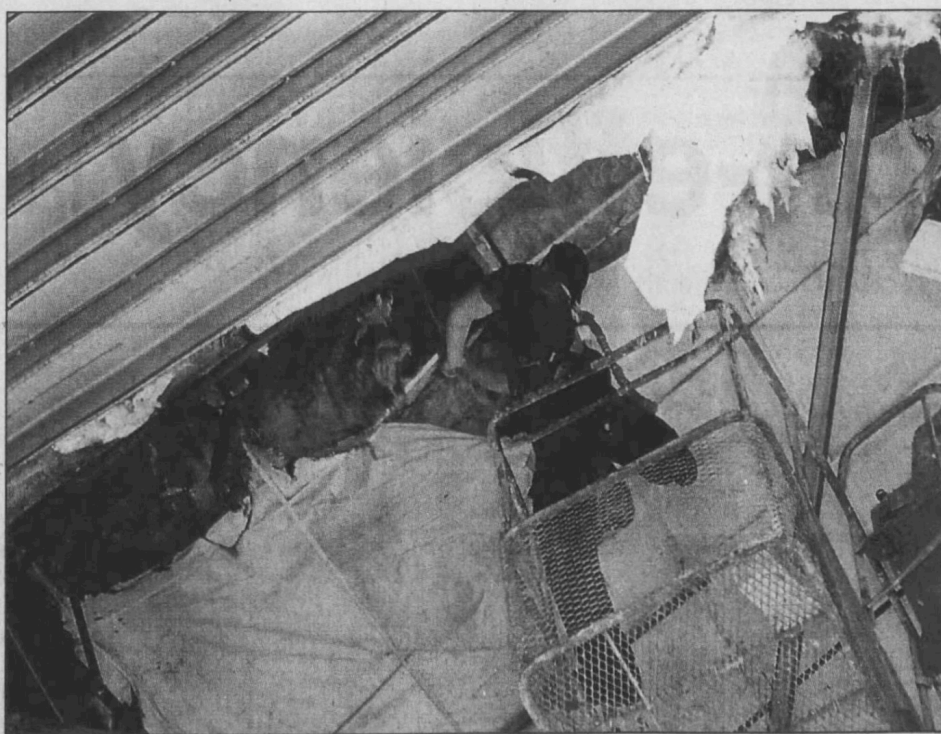

Beyond the tourniquet of yellow police tape, Mary Jane Medlock looked at the mound of rubble still smoldering a few dozen yards away. The smoke billowing from the pile was all that remained of the Yankee Air Museum in Van Buren Township.

Before the flames overran the building, Medlock, 52, and three other museum volunteers pushed an 18,000-pound C47 airplane out of the World War II-era hangar and from harm's way.

"I'm not a hero," said Medlock, a Saline resident, whose left arm had a spray of red bruises from the rescue. "I just wanted to get them out, to save what we could, so we didn't lose everything."

\$1m blaze at Burl Air Park destroys hanger, up to 15 aircraft

Fire demolished a Burlington aircraft hangar and destroyed most of the aircraft within as firefighters from several communities battled the blaze.

"It's a huge, huge fire," said Ben Rotsma, spokesperson for the Burlington Fire Department. "The damage is going to be extremely high," at least \$1 million.

The fire at the Burlington Air Park, on Bell School Line, started at around 7:50 p.m. yesterday. The first crews saw flames shooting from the collapsed roof and heard an explosion.

Firefighters faced two difficulties right away. The steel hangar, which is about 130 metres long and 16 metres wide, is entered through an electric door. Because of the fire, the door wouldn't operate so tractors had to be brought in to pull the door open.

Second, rural Burlington doesn't have fire hydrants. Tanker trucks came from Burlington, Hamilton, and Milton to provide water. Each truck poured its water into a temporary tank at the scene, and then shuttled back and forth to a hydrant to get more water.

Help also came from the Oakville Fire Department and from the Greater Toronto Airport Authority, which provided a foam truck.

The flames were out within an hour but crews worked into the night, pulling the hangar apart to get at the deep-seated embers.

Firefighters saved one aircraft from the flames, but up to 15 planes burned. A used two-seat Cessna is typically worth around \$20,000 to \$30,000.

The cause of the fire is unknown but not believed to be suspicious.

Burlington Air Park is privately owned.

GRAND ISLAND (AP) — A large airport hangar collapsed after it caught fire Tuesday night, destroying two airplanes inside worth a total \$8 million.

The cause of the fire was not immediately known. No injuries were reported.

Each airplane was worth about \$4 million, said Doug Voss, Great Lakes chief executive officer. He expected insurance to cover not only the loss of the planes but also equipment inside the 26,000-square-foot, 50-year-old hangar.

The airline leased the hangar from the airport authority. Voss said construction was being completed on a new hangar door when the fire started.

Voss expected only short-term flight changes in and out of Grand Island because of the

fire.

The airport authority has promised to provide Great Lakes with another hangar, Voss said.

Witnesses reported hearing three small explosions before the building collapsed at about 7:30 p.m., Schmidt said. Pilots also reported hearing small "pops," probably airplane tires exploding, she said.

The hangar's roof and walls all came down in the collapse. All that was left late Tuesday was smoldering piles of rubble.

Other airport operations were not affected.

Navy Helicopter Destroyed in Fire in Puerto Williams

The institution issued a statement detailing that a short circuit was the cause of the fire that affected the Naval Air Force hangar and helicopter last night.

PUERTO WILLIAMS—A short circuit caused a fire last night at hangar number 2 of the Naval Air Force at the "Guardiamarina Zañartu" station in Puerto Williams, leading to the complete destruction of a Bolkow Navy helicopter. According to the institution's statement, the fire started around 10:00 PM. The aircraft, registration N-45, was stationed in the Beagle Naval District under the command of the Third Naval Zone.

The statement confirmed that no personal injuries were reported. A fire broke out in one of Varig's hangars at Salgado Filho Airport in Porto Alegre on the night of Friday, July 7, 1999, injuring several Varig employees. The injured were Carlos Reinaldo Carvalho da Silva and Fabiano Martins Ramos, who were admitted to the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) of the Burns Department at the Emergency Hospital in Porto Alegre. A third victim, Leandro Wolf da Silva, was also admitted to the same hospital in serious condition. Additionally, another victim was taken to Cristo Redentor Hospital that night.

The accident, according to the company, occurred at 9:30 PM the day before yesterday during the cleaning of the cargo compartment of a Varig Boeing 727 aircraft, the PP-VLD, which was parked inside Hangar 4. A group of 15 people was working inside and around the plane. Varig engineer Alexandre Marinksek, who was interviewed by the newspaper, described the incident as a "work accident" caused by a "fire outbreak" in the cargo hold. He believed that the most seriously injured workers likely had difficulty escaping from the cargo hold where the fire started. The flames lasted no more than "about five minutes," according to Marinksek, and were quickly brought under control. "The company has launched an investigation to determine what really happened," he commented. The police forensic team examined the Boeing, but the results of the investigation are still unknown.

The incident occurred while the plane was undergoing maintenance at Varig's CEMAN facility in Porto Alegre, inside Hangar 4, with seven mechanics working directly on the aircraft. They were using a highly volatile and flammable liquid product to clean the rear right cargo hold. The fire was reportedly caused by a cleaning cloth soaked in the liquid that fell onto a hot lamp, igniting an explosion. This explosion triggered a chain reaction, setting off the other dirty cloths on the floor and the fumes in the air, leading to a larger explosion and subsequent fire.

The tight space, along with the accumulated fumes and the presence of the liquid container, turned the cargo hold into a virtual bomb. Although there were reports that three mechanics died, the official version states that there was only one fatality. Most of the workers on the PP-VLD were not Varig employees but mechanics-in-training. The fire was primarily controlled by Varig's own firefighting brigade, and the Military Police Firefighters were initially prevented from entering Varig's premises when they arrived at the gate. They were allowed to enter Hangar 4 after some negotiation, once the situation was relatively under control. No public photos of the accident exist, as the press was not given access to the site.

As Hangar C burned to the ground last night at the Whitehorse airport, Al Kapyt, the co-founder of Trans North Helicopters, trembled as he drove up Robert Service Way.

The pulsating glow rising from the last of the Whitehorse airport's Second World War-vintage hangars sent its frantic signal of burning destruction.

"I was at my house, and I got the call about 7:20 p.m." Kapyt recalled this morning. "I went out of my house and jumped in my car, but before I jumped in, I could see the big red glow in the sky - and I knew we had a real major problem on our hands.... It's just a terrible, terrible tragedy.

"It's unbelievable," continued the veteran aviation executive. "I shook driving to the airport. I was in shock."

Whitehorse fire Chief Brian Monahan said this morning the cause of the fire that destroyed the early-1940s fir-framed structure is under investigation. Kapyt himself remains baffled by the cause.

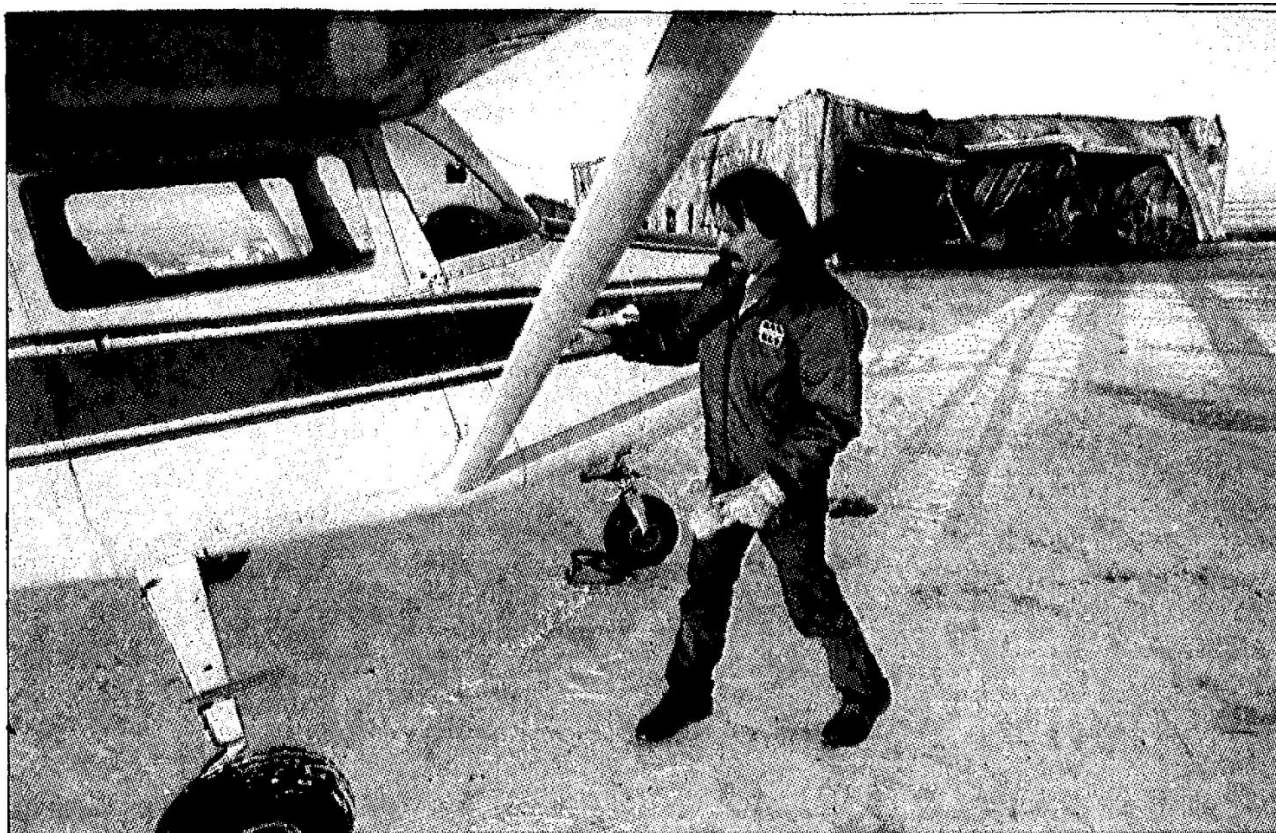
The blaze came sooner than 5 1/2 years after Hangar B was destroyed by fire while its roof was being retarred. There were no injuries last night, but 16 aircraft were destroyed, representing several million dollars in value.

Fire destroys hangar, aircraft at St. Andrews

ST. ANDREWS (Staff) — A fire yesterday destroyed a hangar and two private planes at the airport here.

Airport manager Ralph Haines said damage in the blaze, which started about 12:50 p.m., totalled about \$360,000, including \$200,000 to the hangar, owned by the Southeast Tribal Council, and another \$160,000 to two aircraft.

Haines said the fire burned for about 3½ hours and, while some traffic had to be rerouted.

Edwin Carter, chief of the St. Andrews volun-

teer fire department, said the first pumper truck arrived within 12 minutes of the blaze erupting.

Carter said a pump, about a kilometre from the hangar and connected to a reservoir, was used to fill the pumper trucks that shuttled back and forth, allowing firefighters to extinguish the blaze.

The pump was to be officially tested for its first use next week but — luckily — worked without the test, he said.

Bruce Bodner, an electrician who had a Cessna 172 in the hangar for a wheel repair, said his

aircraft was apparently pulled out quickly because it sustained no damage.

Bodner said the two aircraft destroyed in the hangar were a Cessna 206 and a Comanche 250.

He said the tribal council has a Twin Navajo, but it wasn't in the hangar at the time.

Rod Bushie, tribal council chairman, said the aircraft wasn't damaged and will be kept in another hangar. He said the aircraft is used to provide service to four fly-in reserves in the eight-member council.

During maintenance at Moscow-Domodedovo Airport a fuel tank in the right wing caught fire while a valve was being changed. Fuel was ignited by an electrical lamp. The fire could not be extinguished and the aircraft burnt out.

A Navy F-14A Tomcat jet fighter crashed upside down into hangars at Gillespie Field on Monday morning after the two fliers aboard bailed out over downtown El Cajon.

The two aviators and three people in the hangars were seriously injured, and 19 aircraft and 13 vehicles were damaged or destroyed in the crash and fire that followed.

The jet had developed mechanical troubles while on a training flight over the ocean and was attempting to return to Miramar Naval Air Station, Navy spokesman Lt. David Wray said.

Further troubles caused the fliers to head for Gillespie, a general aviation airport about 10 miles southeast of Miramar. The two ejected from the high-performance jet fighter while the out-of-control plane was upside down doing barrel rolls over downtown El Cajon.

Witnesses said the plane, as if it had a mind of its own, then rolled on its back, pointed its nose toward the sky and descended slowly to the airport, where it veered west to crash into one hangar at 10:19 a.m., then skidded into a second hangar.

“Seconds later, there was a very loud explosion and a very large plume of orange fire and dark black smoke,” said Jeffrey Thomas Napier, an off-duty San Diego police officer who was standing 500 yards away.

Lucky Landing Spot

The pilot of the jet suffered several broken bones and cuts. The second flier had a broken neck. The three people injured in hangars, one of which was occupied by Sky Dance Helicopter Operations, include a man who lost a leg and a helicopter mechanic who was burned over 35% of his body. Navy officials said it was lucky that the jet was not carrying weapons and that it hadn’t crashed in the residential and commercial areas near the airfield.

History of Our Voodoo

CF-101B/ VOODOO 101037

This twin-engine, super-sonic, all-weather Air Defence fighter 037 was originally an F-101B-95-MC / Voodoo built by McDonnell and first entered service with the USAF as s/n 57-366. It was Taken On Strength (TOS) by the CF on 2 December 1970 with 416 All Weather Fighter (AWF) Squadron at CFB Bagotville, Quebec. 416 AWF Sqn later moved to Chatham NB where it operated until disbanded. In addition to its Air Defence duties, Voodoo 037 also participated in the 416 Sqn air demonstration team. On 23 June, 1975, 037 suffered a fuel tank explosion and fire during maintenance. The fire was quickly contained by ground crew and the aircraft was repaired. In 1984, Voodoo 037 became an instructional airframe and was eventually shipped to CFB Summerside for use in battle damage repair training.
